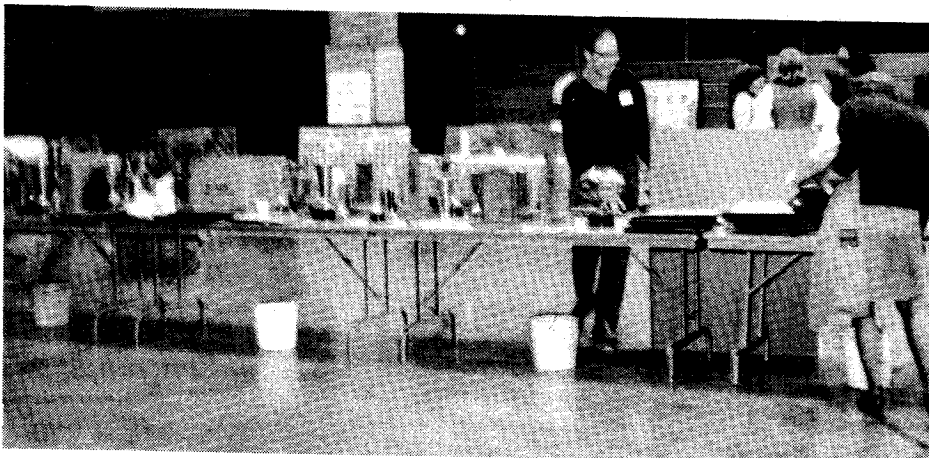
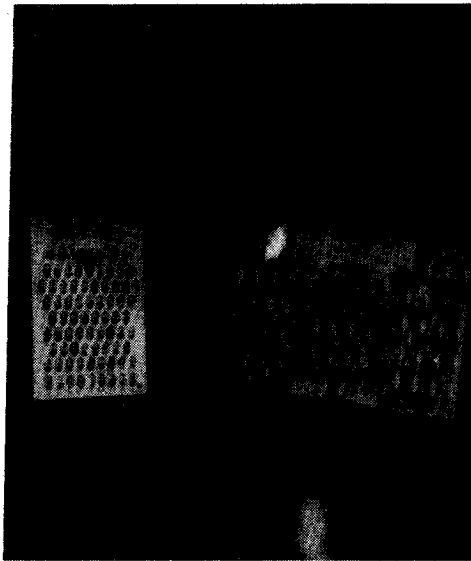
Dr. Lauderman and Jones Junior High School sponsored Archive Night November 8. At this event were items such as class pictures and trophies that were found in the attic and basement.

People attending the Archive Night activities formed a committee to decide what to do with the antiques.

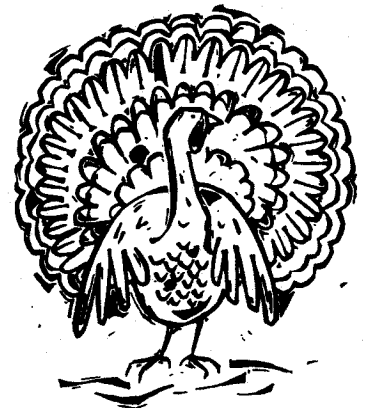

The students are looking forward to another field trip to the Ohio Historical Society on Dec. 12.



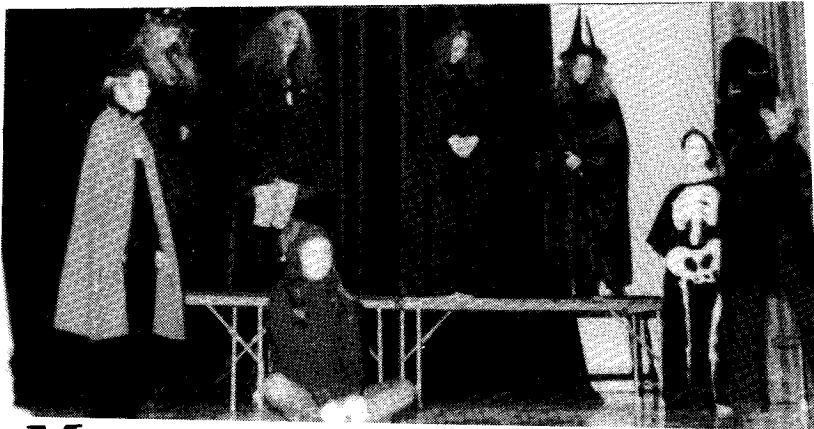
Lights Up
